Justifications for Response and Change



Yemen continues to be the world's largest humanitarian crisis and relief operation. This crisis is the result of the violent armed conflict that escalated seven years ago. It has killed and wounded tens of thousands of civilians and caused great suffering to Yemenis.

In 2021, the conflict intensified and caused 172,000 displacement, resulting in at least 4 million IDPs.

The collapse of the economy and currency continued with the depletion of foreign reserves and the inability of the government to support 90% of the food and other goods that Yemen relies on for import.

Due to the global decline caused by Covid-19 pandemic, the situation has worsened, resulting in a sharp decline in remittances - the largest source of foreign currency and lifeline for many families, where 80 per cent of the population lives below the poverty line.

As a result, millions of other people could not afford to meet their basic needs. The fuel crisis has also worsened, particularly in northern Yemen, and the transportations costs have increased. The Government's ability to pay salaries and pensions to public officials on a regular basis has been hampered and public services have deteriorated.

The conflict has disrupted economic activities on a large scale, and has significantly reduced employment and income in the private and public sectors, with the economy contracting by an estimated 50% over the past three years.


Based on the analysis of 2022 Humanitarian Needs Overview, it is estimated that 20.7 million people, 66% of the total population, need humanitarian assistance. It is also estimated that 12.1 million people are in dire need. These people face a crisis or worse levels of extreme need to get the necessities of life and maintain their health and safety and their coping strategies just to survive.



Education Program

Access to safe education remains a challenge for children in Yemen. The prolonged crisis has led to the interruption of education for about 2.05 million children. Tamdeen Youth Foundation, in partnership with Yemen Humanitarian Fund OCHA, implemented two projects in 2021. It enabled 6,869 children to attend school in safe and healthy environments, where children received basic support in nutrition, education and health care.

Health and Nutrition Program

In 2021 Yemen's health system was deteriorating with the worsening economic crisis, the consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic, and the conflict that destroyed many health facilities. There were 27.7 people in urgent need of health care and nutrition. Through its active partnership with OCHA, TYF has been able to contribute to promoting the health system and operating a range of health facilities to provide basic health services, reduce disease outbreaks and address the immediate and underlying causes of malnutrition.

Socio-economic Development Sector

In light of the economic, political and social changes that have taken place in Yemeni society over the past six years, which have seen an increase in the frequency of armed conflict, the resulting cessation of a large part of the productive processes in the economy, the absence of the Government from the economic landscape and the complete cessation of public investment programs, unemployment and poverty rates have increased primarily within society and among youth.

TYF has therefore paid particular attention to the recovery, economic recovery and community development sector by focusing on linking humanitarian assistance to development and investing in available domestic resources and human capital to create sustainable sources of income, jobs and solutions.





Job Fair Project

In an innovative way, free from the constraints of traditional recruitment processes, the project allowed job-seekers and new graduates to present their resumes, browse the companies, communicate directly with their representatives, attend seminars, share information on available jobs, develop their skills, inform them of the needs of the labor market and train them to the advantage of both parties, to those jobs-seekers and to private sector companies looking to hire the best.

On December 14, 2021, Tamdeen Youth Foundation was elected as a member of the Governing Body of the Climate Action Network in the Arab World for the period 2022-2023 represented by Ms. Amani Abdul Razzaq Thabet (Deputy General Writer).

The network protects the climate, promotes renewable energy, and develops development strategies to reduce carbon emissions from enterprises throughout the region. The network also focuses on areas related to protecting the region from water scarcity, climate change and food insecurity.

It is part of the Global Climate Action Network, which represents more than 900 members in more than 90 countries.



Initiatives



To translate TYF's vision of contributing to recovery and sustainable development, initiatives and campaigns are part of its work to harness all available resources and potential to improve the quality of life and to enable environments with minimum conditions of human dignity.





Humanitarian Action Localization Initiative

It aims to optimize humanitarian response in Yemen with a more comprehensive and effective participatory approach, to ensure that all those in need have access to rapid, effective and sustainable humanitarian assistance, and to enable local organizations to play their natural role in the humanitarian action system.

August 19: Launching the "Localization of Humanitarian Action Initiative in Yemen" and issuing a joint statement by 66 Yemeni NGOs.

September - December2021: Preparing a baseline and creating an enabling environment in collaboration with ICVA, HAG and Itar Foundation


